Suggestions and Advice with *If I were you ...*

It's common to give suggestions and advice in this form:

If I were* you, I'd (I would) change my shoes.
= I'd change my shoes if I were you.

*In unreal *if* sentences (second conditional), we usually use **were** for all subjects. Using *was* is OK informally.

[Sample answers]

1. A: I can't decide if I want to keep taking piano lessons or not.
B: I'd keep taking the lessons if I were you.
2. A: I'm so tired I can hardly stay awake, but I have a project to finish by tomorrow.
B: If I were you, I'd tell the teacher and ask for another day.
3. A: I got mad at my best friend and said something really mean to her. Now I feel guilty.
B: If I were you, I'd apologize and do something nice for her.
